Low-carbon systems, disaster-resilient healthcare, healthsystems leapfrog in LMICs, etc.

Adaptation for health

Identifying and scaling adaptation measures to address the impacts of climate change on health (including through One Health)

Evaluation, UHC, urban planning, financing, nature-based solutions, etc.

Action for health, relief, recovery & peace

Taking action at the nexus of health and relief, recovery and peace

Healthcare in disaster and complex emergency contexts, anticipatory action and prevention, etc.
