Definition of child maltreatment

The definition of child maltreatment used in this questionnaire is as follows: "all forms of physical and/or emotional ill-treatment, sexual abuse, neglect or negligent treatment or commercial or other exploitation, resulting in actual or potential harm to the child's health, survival, development or dignity in the context of a relationship of responsibility, trust or power."* Child maltreatment can occur in many different settings. The perpetrators of child maltreatment may be parents and other family members, caregivers, friends, acquaintances, strangers, others in authority – such as teachers, soldiers, police officers and clergy, employers, health care workers, and other children.

It is important that the <u>difference between child protection and child maltreatment prevention</u> as it is being used in this questionnaire be very clear to you. This <u>questionnaire ONLY pertains</u> <u>to child maltreatment prevention</u>, <u>NOT child protection</u>

<u>Child protection</u> (or child protection services) refers to measures taken **after** child maltreatment has occurred and includes investigating and trying to substantiate reports of suspected child abuse and providing support, care, and treatment for the traumatized child;

<u>Child maltreatment prevention</u>, the focus of this questionnaire, refers to measures taken to prevent child maltreatment **before** it occurs by addressing the underlying causes and risk and protective factors – such as teaching positive parenting skills to pregnant first-time mothers.
