

Highlights of the collaboration with WHO's Standby Partners

Partnerships

In 2024, WHO signed a new Standby Partner agreement with the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC). The agreement with the Swedish Civil Contingencies Agency (MSB) was also finalized in October 2024 and officially signed in February 2025. WHO currently maintains **11 active Standby Partner agreements** with CANADEM, the Center for International Peace Operations (ZIF), the Danish Emergency Management Agency (DEMA), the Government of the Netherlands (RVO), iMMAP Inc., MapAction, NORCAP (part of the Norwegian Refugee Council), RedR Australia, the Swedish Civil Contingencies Agency (MSB), the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC), and UK-Med. WHO expresses its sincere appreciation for the continued collaboration and support of its partners.

Collaboration on training: Strengthening Mental Health and Psychosocial Support for Emergency Deployments

From December 16-19, 2024, WHO, in collaboration with UNICEF, UNHCR, and RVO, conducted a training in Istanbul, Türkiye, to enhance MHPSS professionals' expertise for emergency response.

A total of **29 MHPSS experts** from Standby Partner organizations - **RVO, NORCAP, SDC, ZIF, UK-MED, RedR Australia, MSB** - participated. Funded by the Netherlands and WHO, this initiative supported the global MHPSS Surge Mechanism, enabling rapid psychosocial response in humanitarian crises.

Ongoing collaboration will enhance global mental health response capacity and ensure critical support for affected populations.
