Addressing Antimicrobial Resistance Challenges Including in Migrant and Refugee Populations

Antimicrobial resistance (AMR) is one of the greatest global public health challenges, with low- and middle-income countries hit hardest. The misuse of antimicrobials in humans, animals, and plants drives drug-resistant pathogens, disproportionately affecting groups such as migrants and refugees who often face barriers to healthcare. Join us for a hybrid side event addressing AMR's impact, emphasizing the critical need for international cooperation and targeted actions to improve access to and appropriate use of antibiotics.

Co-organized by the Arab Republic of Egypt, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, and the World Health Organization, this event will bring together Ministries of Health, UN Agencies, international organizations, health leaders, and representatives from civil society. Together, we will present current evidence, share best practices, and explore key policy measures to enhance antibiotic access and use, particularly for refugees and migrants.
