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


Universal Health Coverage

Which services should be covered?

- We work in a resource constrained environment
- All health systems apply rationing implicit or explicit
- Explicit criteria can be a way to encourage transparency and improve access to care
- Countries want to institutionalise a mechanism for transparent and fair decision making processes
- There is no one-size fits all approach



Incorporating local values

- Resource allocation decisions are rife with moral disagreements
- Different individuals and groups will have different values, for good reason
- Need stakeholder buy-in of the values incorporated in the decision making process
- Some values which may be considered:

Doing the greatest good for the greatest number of people

Pursuing principles of solidarity, fairness, financial protection



Gathering the evidence

Is it safe and effective?

Is it cost-effective and affordable?

Does it target those who are disadvantaged or vulnerable?

Will it improve financial protection?

Are there other ethical considerations?


Decision making across institutions
