Tuesday, 3 December

10:45–12:45, Prudence Mabele (MH 2+ Corridor) WHO/ HE2RO skills building session: Using economic analysis to plan and budget for your HIV testing and PrEP programmes

Through this skill-building session, participants will gain an understanding of cost-effectiveness and budget impact analysis for implementing high-impact HIV testing services and PrEP programmes.

13:00–15:00, Cheick sidy Modibo Kane (MH 1) UNAIDS, WHO, PEPFAR and Jhpiego: Amplifying our gains in HIV prevention for men: increasing the impact and sustainability of voluntary medical male circumcision in 2020 and beyond

This satellite session will feature the story of voluntary medical male circumcision as an effective HIV prevention intervention, and key recommendations and evidence from updated WHO guidance.

12:45-14:15, Jeanne Gapiya (MH 4) New treatment guidelines, paediatric treatment and strategies for transition to DTG regimens

Participants will be updated on the latest scientific evidence on the efficacy and safety of dolutegravir (DTG), and how to conduct a smooth transition from TLE (tenofivir-lamivudine-efavirinz) to TLD (tenofivir-lamivudine-DTG) based regimens.

This session will provide an overview of the approach to improve primary health care and equitable access to quality health services, including those aimed at eliminating HIV, tuberculosis (TB) and malaria through integrated services.

Wednesday, 4 December

This session will build upon new WHO guidance on family planning, HIV testing and the importance of integrated approaches. It will also highlight the need to integrate HIV testing into family planning services, focusing on high HIV burden settings in the context of the ECHO trial results.

Testing for 2030: new WHO guidelines on HIV testing services – strategies for reaching the undiagnosed

This session aims to share recent progress with viral hepatitis responses and selected good practice examples from across sub-Saharan Africa.

MDR TB in HIV and non-HIV infected individuals: implications for HIV/TB coinfection management

The session will present the experiences of the programmatic management of multi-drugresistant (MDR)-TB in the WHO African Region.

TB preventive therapy in Africa: translating UN high-level meeting rhetoric into reality

This session will feature programme experiences in implementing TB preventive treatment (TPT) services, with partner organizations sharing perspectives on scale-up across the continuum, from identification of eligible clients to completion of TPT in priority countries.

This meeting will describe the situation of the Ebola virus disease (EBV) outbreak in West Africa and eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, and discuss strategies for mitigation/anticipation, to be integrated into preparedness and/or response plans.

STI control is critical in HIV and SRH programmes: current challenges and opportunities

This session will explore challenges and opportunities for addressing the social and scientific barriers and lack of dialogue on sexually transmitted infections (STIs), and highlight the importance of budgeting for and integrating STI control into national primary health care programmes, including HIV and sexual and reproductive health (SRH), to achieve universal coverage.

Elimination of mother-to-child transmission of HIV, syphilis and hepatitis B virus in high-burden countries – updates, tools and way forward

This session will include updates and lessons learned on the progress so far in high-burden countries towards processes for validation/certification on the "path to elimination".
