Important note: Presentations of country systems should be around 20 – 25 minutes long to allow enough time for discussion. Presentations should include (but not necessarily be limited to):

- Rationale for building the system
- How the solution was developed/chosen
- Main characteristics of the system (for example data captured, case-based or not, web-based or not, who uses it, where is it used, links to other systems, geographical coverage, etc)
- Data quality and validation procedures
- How system was built, tested and rolled out; how it is maintained and future development plans
- Difficulties faced both during implementation and at present
- Key lessons learnt during design and implementation
- Advice (based on your country's experience) for other countries considering implementing an electronic recording and reporting system (for example, what do you know now that you wish was known when the system was being designed and/or rolled out?)

*After initial discussions and drafting of Chapter 2 and Chapter 3, the structure/content of these chapters was revisited. It was agreed that Chapter 2 would explain all of the important topics to be considered when adopting and designing an ERR system, in each case defining the topic (if necessary), explaining why the topic is important, what the main choices/options are, and then listing the main recommendations. Chapter 3 would then briefly outline the structure/content of a request for proposals/design specification, based on the structure of Chapter 2.

As a consequence, on Day 2 the meeting will focus most on review and discussion of Chapter 2, including identification of topics that are missing or where more content is needed, discussion of recommendations especially those that may be contentious with the aim of reaching consensus, and identification of which countries could be used as case studies to illustrate what all of the topics/choices/recommendations mean in practice.

Once there is agreement on Chapter 2, it is anticipated that Chapter 3 will then be relatively straightforward to finalize. Chapter 4 was always intended to be written after the meeting, based on the country experience presented and discussed at the meeting and associated background documents.
