GOVERNMENT LEADERS PLEDGE ACTION ON HEALTH CARE-ASSOCIATED INFECTION

Geneva - Each year, hundreds of millions of patients worldwide acquire infections in hospitals. Now more than half the people in the world can look forward to cleaner and safer care, and a lowered risk of becoming ill with an infection as a result of their health care. That is because they live in one of the 22 countries whose governments have pledged to become part of a worldwide movement to address health care-associated infections, under the Global Patient Safety Challenge: *Clean Care is Safer Care*.

On 10 November, 11 more countries — Australia, Belgium, Bhutan, Costa Rica, Finland, Kenya, Luxembourg, Singapore, Sudan, Uganda and the United States— will sign statements of commitment to the initiative. Seven countries and regions — Bangladesh, Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) States, Hong Kong SAR, Ireland, Italy, Scotland, Spain— will report on their first year of achievements as part of the Global Patient Safety Challenge
