




Where are we today?

The risk of dying from a major NCD between the ages of 30-70



Rights and Wrongs of HLMs on NCDs: Divergence of views

LOSS

HLMs created more challenges to address NCDs in countries

BIG LOSS

HLMs have caused more premature deaths from NCDs

BREAK-EVEN

HLMs have not accelerated progress, nor hindered progress


GAIN

HLMs have created new opportunities to address NCDs in countries

HIGH GAIN

HLMs have saved lives and prevented premature deaths from NCDs

"The political gains in 2011 were offset by a huge increase in industry lobbying against implementation of the WHO best buys and other recommended interventions, working to discredit current scientific knowledge, available evidence and reviews of international experience, and bringing legal challenges to oppose progress. In some instances, these efforts were now actively supported by other countries, for instance through international trade disputes" (former Health Attaché in Geneva)




"Implementation of the Political Declaration required international resources for technical cooperation. Parliaments of several countries known to provide development aid acknowledged that convincing their tax payers to deliver aid to curb NCDs in developing countries was a "hard sell" that lacked an "enlightened self-interest" where "win-wins" and "mutual benefits" were possible, unlike infectious diseases "that do have real consequences closer to home" (former WHO senior official)


LOSS

No ODA or international financing instruments




"The Political Declaration on UHC commits countries to address NCDs as part of UHC and progressively cover additional people with essential health services and medicines for NCDs"





In 2012, 2013 and **2014**, the Cook Islands Government implemented three consecutive import levies on cigarettes and tobacco with 33% increase each year.








 Adoption of the Tobacco-Free Pacific Goal by 2025 with an adult smoking prevalence of less than 5% in each country;


Second Meeting of ACP Ministers of Health, 25 to 26 February 2015, Brussels, Belgium

The Ministers of Health from African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) countries met for the Second Meeting of ACP Ministers of Health held from 25 to 26 February 2015. The first ACP Ministers of Health meeting was held in 2007. The meeting was preceded by the ACP Senior Health Officials' meeting from 23 to 24 February 2015. The main focus was to exchange views on the challenges and strategies of

the health sector in the post-2015 period.

To this end, discussions were focused on strengthening health systems and the importance of countries being vigilant and prepared. This was further emphasized in light of the Ebola outbreak in Africa and other diseases such as Malaria and Chikungunya, of which the latter remains prevalent in the Caribbean and Pacific regions. Ministers also reaffirmed the need to include health as a key item on the post-2015 development agenda. Other health issues such as nutrition, finance predictability, Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) and Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs), as well as progress on the Millennium Development Goals on health were common concerns amongst the countries present and were discussed at length.

Africa-Carribean-Pacific (ACP)



- Mobilize resources to implement programmes for the prevention and control of NCDs including mental health diseases and substance abuse as well as NTDs targeted for elimination.
- 13. Strengthen the HRH policy environment (planning, training, recruitment, and retention) and leadership, as well as regulation of health professionals, maintain and develop HRH information systems at the national level, and additionally propose that training Programmes in ACP Countries for health workers, need to be integrated into national skills strategies/plans, involving public and private stakeholders to ensure that these are responsive to local needs of the communities and specific attention will be paid to skills retention as well as capacity building through South-South cooperation.




HSS for NCD: UHC Partnership

Japan, Rep of Korea: 8%






Fiji, Yemen: 31%

Rapid improvements in coverage of infectious disease in UHC packages since 2000, vs relatively little change on NCDs




Evidence-based solutions

- Critical need to integrate programmes and technical guidance that largely remain siloed within NCDs and other programmes.























- Responsibility of All to ensure this sustained effort




Walking the Talk
