Key elements of implementing BFHI nationwide

- 1. Ensure oversight of BFHI implementation in all maternity facilities in the country
- 2. Incorporate protection, promotion and support of breastfeeding in maternity facilities into national policy documents, professional standards of care.
- 3. Ensure that all health professionals and managers engaged in maternal and newborn care have adequate capacity to implement the national BFHI standards and management procedures.
- 4. Develop external assessment systems
- 5. Develop and implement incentives for compliance and/or sanctions for non-compliance with the national standards.
- 6. Execute strategies to scale up application of the BFHI standards to all maternity facilities.
- 7. Develop and maintain a monitoring system on the implementation of the programme.
- 8. Ensure the ongoing funding of the initiative.

Policies and standards of care

- Protection, promotion and support for breastfeeding in maternity facilities to be integrated in all relevant policy and planning documents e.g.
 - National Nutrition Policy
 - Plan of Action for Breastfeeding
 - Child Survival Strategy
 - National development strategy
 - others...

Policies and standards of care

Policy implementation would facilitate and ensure inclusion in national budgets

Policies and standards of care

- Clinical practices should be written into the standards of care for professional bodies
 - Ob/gyn, midwifery, paediatrics, neonatology, nursing, dietetics
- Management procedures to be reflected in relevant guidance documents
- Monitoring systems to check adherence to standards

Capacity strengthening

- Health professionals need to have adequate knowledge and skills to implement the BFHI practices
 - Shared responsibility between individual facilities and national system
 - Both pre-service and in-service training are needed



Capacity strengthening

- Pre-service training of health workers
 - Include breastfeeding
 - Develop national curricula
 - Clinical standards
 - Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes
 - Both theoretical and practical
- Teaching staff need training as well





Capacity strengthening

- Continuing education and in-service training also important
 - Many existing health workers did not receive training
 - Need refreshers
 - Need to keep up with latest science
- Electronic courses can play a role in combination with face-to-face interaction and direct observation
- Competency-based assessment is critical
