Professor Stuart Batterman

Stuart Batterman is Professor of Environmental Health Sciences and Global Public Health at the School of Public Health, and Professor of Civil and Water Resources Engineering at the College of Engineering, at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor in the United States of America. Professor Batterman's areas of expertise include environmental and occupational health and engineering, ambient and indoor air quality, water quality, environmental economics, environmental impact assessment, exposure and risk assessment, cost-benefit analysis, and life cycle assessment.
