The workshop focused on Enhancing Health Systems to Achieve Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Universal Health Coverage (UHC) in Bangladesh. Dr. Bardan Jung Rana, WHO Representative to Bangladesh, reiterated WHO's commitment to promoting Universal Health Coverage through robust Primary Health Care in Bangladesh. Dr. Rana highlighted the importance of acknowledging achievements, recognizing challenges, and collectively committing to achieving universal health coverage. During the workshop, Ms. Sangay Wangmo provided insights into the status of Universal Health Coverage globally, regionally, and specifically in Bangladesh. The weeklong review of Bangladesh's Field Epidemiology Training Program (FETP) took place from April 21 to April 25, 2024.

As of January 2023, over 324 physicians and veterinarians have participated, contributing to COVID-19 response, conducting outbreak investigations, and advancing public health knowledge. Read more

Revising the Bangladesh National Health Care Financing Strategy (HCFS)



In 2012, Bangladesh adopted the National Health Financing Strategy (HCFS) 2012-2032 with the aim of achieving universal health coverage (UHC), thereby safeguarding citizens from financial risks, improving efficiency and equity, and strengthening health systems. Recognizing the need for strategic adjustments, the Health Economics Unit (HEU) of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW), in partnership with WHO Bangladesh, conducted a comprehensive review of the strategy in 2023.

This collaboration has been instrumental in identifying gaps and challenges within the current HCFS. Moving forward, the HEU is taking the lead in the revision process, with continued support from WHO Bangladesh. The goal is to ensure that the revised national healthcare financing strategy effectively addresses both existing and emerging challenges in health service delivery and financing.

Mental Health Gap Action Programme (mhGAP) training held in Pabna and Dhaka

With support from World Health Organization (WHO) Bangladesh and the Non-Communicable Disease Control (NCDC) Program of the Directorate General of Health Services (DGHS), three batches of three-days Mental Health Gap Action Programme (mhGAP) training successfully took place in Pabna and Dhaka by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). The training sessions were held in Pabna from 4–6 May 2024, from 19–21 May and 9–11 June 2024 in Dhaka. A total of sixty-five healthcare professionals, including physicians, psychologists, and nurses participated in the training. The objective of the mhGAP training was to further strengthen primary health care services by training more nonspecialist health care providers. Experts from NIMH, Mental Hospital Pabna, Shaheed Ziaur Rahman Medical College Hospital and WHO conducted those trainings. Dr Shafquat Waheed, Director of the Mental Hospital Pabna, and Dr Sahidullah Dewan, Civil Surgeon of Pabna, attended the training held in Pabna. Professor Dr. Avra Das Bhowmik, Director of NCDC, and Professor Dr. Md. Robed Amin, Line Director of NCDC, attended the trainings held in Dhaka. The mhGAP Intervention Guide Bangladesh Version 2021 was familiarized to participants throughout the training sessions. In the practical sessions, they developed skills in assessing and managing mental health conditions.

PRSM orientation for newly recruited staff, third-party contract staff and collaborators of WHO



During the second quarter (April to June 2024), activities related to Prevention and Response to Sexual Misconduct (PRSM) primarily focused on enhancing the capabilities of newly recruited staff, third-party contract staff, and collaborators within the World Health Organization (WHO). Specifically, four orientation sessions on PRSM were conducted, training a total of 129 individuals of World Health Coordination Office (WCO) and World Support Office (WSO).

The primary objective of these orientation sessions was to deepen participants' awareness and understanding of PRSM within WHO. They were introduced to WHO's approach to addressing sexual misconduct and other abusive conduct, including the Policy on Addressing Sexual Misconduct (PASM) and the Policy on Addressing Abusive Conduct (PAAC). These policies outlined their roles and responsibilities not only in preventing sexual misconduct but also in addressing broader forms of abusive conduct. Additionally, the sessions provided practical demonstrations on how to disclose, submit, and report complaints of sexual misconduct and abusive conduct to the Incident Oversight System (IOS).

This geographical isolation poses a significant challenge for healthcare delivery. Despite these obstacles, the Government EPI team of Dewanganj upazila persevered and conducted their vaccination sessions without interruption.

Dr. Saifullah, the Surveillance & Immunization Medical Officer for Jamalpur, ensured meticulous supervision of the cold chain maintenance and provided essential on-the-job training to ensure the delivery of high-quality services. Their efforts highlight the commitment of healthcare workers to reach even the most remote communities and protect vulnerable populations, despite adverse conditions.

The WHO has conducted training of teachers of post-graduate medical courses in Government institutes, medical colleges, and universities. Recently, the Research and Publication unit of WHO Bangladesh was represented in the meeting held on 20 March 2024 at BSMMU. The BSMMU Journal has progressed considerably since 2023, in terms of enhancing the quality of publications and indexing. Its current submission-to-acceptance time is forty days reduced from about three hundred days. It has achieved indexing by several authorities. The editorial board expressed their heartfelt gratitude towards WHO for its support in research capacity building of teachers and enhancing the quality of the Journal in 2023. It is mentionable that, the WHO has been supporting BSMMU including BSMMU Journal for capacity building, quality improvement, and indexing since 2023 respectively.
