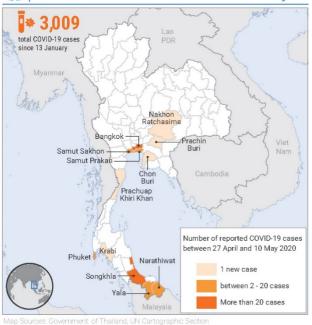


THAILAND SITUATION IN THE PAST 24 HOURS

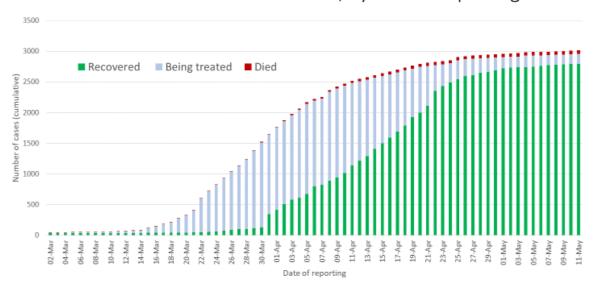
SPOTLIGHT

- On 11th of May 2020, six new cases of laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 were announced by the Ministry of Public Health of Thailand (MoPH), bringing the total number of cases to 3,015.
- Out of the total number of 3015 cases, 2796 (92.7%) have recovered, 163 (5.4%) are still receiving care and 56 (1.9%) have died.
- The new cases are all Thai nationals from the southern provinces. One, a six year old boy is a contact of a confirmed case who is a family member. Another case is a 22 year old male who had contact with confirmed cases from Malaysia. The other cases are two males and two females in the 19-29 years age range, all had worked at or visited crowded places or venues.
- To date, 68 of 77 provinces have reported cases. Nine provinces have never reported cases. A total of 48 provinces have had no new cases reported in the past 28 days, this is an increase of 1 province (Nakhon Phanom) from yesterday's total.
- No deaths were reported today.

UPDATE ON CAPACITY FOR COVID-19 HEALTHCARE

- An operational centre has been established to coordinate between all relevant sectors to manage patient care from testing to discharge, including oversight of bed occupancy and referrals.
- Beds reserved for COVID-19 patients in Bangkok and vicinity include
 - Standard healthcare a total of 2,263 rooms are available including AIIR-ICU (Airborne Infection Isolation Room – Intensive Care Unit), modified AIIR, isolation rooms, cohort wards and hospital rooms.
 - 'Step-down' care a total of 522 rooms at 'hospitels' (at Thammasart University, Rajvithi Hospital; and Chulalongkorn University).
- Relative proportion of the total COVID-19 admissions in different types of hospitals to date
 - Admissions to date have been in private hospitals (40%), medical schools (25%), and hospitals under the Department of Medical Services (11%), the Department of Disease Control (10%), Bangkok Metropolitan Authority (6%), and others (8%).

ADVICE FOR THE PUBLIC

If you are an older adult

- Keep in regular contact with loved ones, for example by telephone, e-mail, social media or video conference.
- Keep regular routines and schedules as much as possible for eating, sleeping, and activities you enjoy.

WHO Thailand is in frequent direct contact with the Royal Thai Government through the Ministry of Public Health, sharing information on key developments, guidelines and scientific updates.

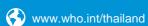
