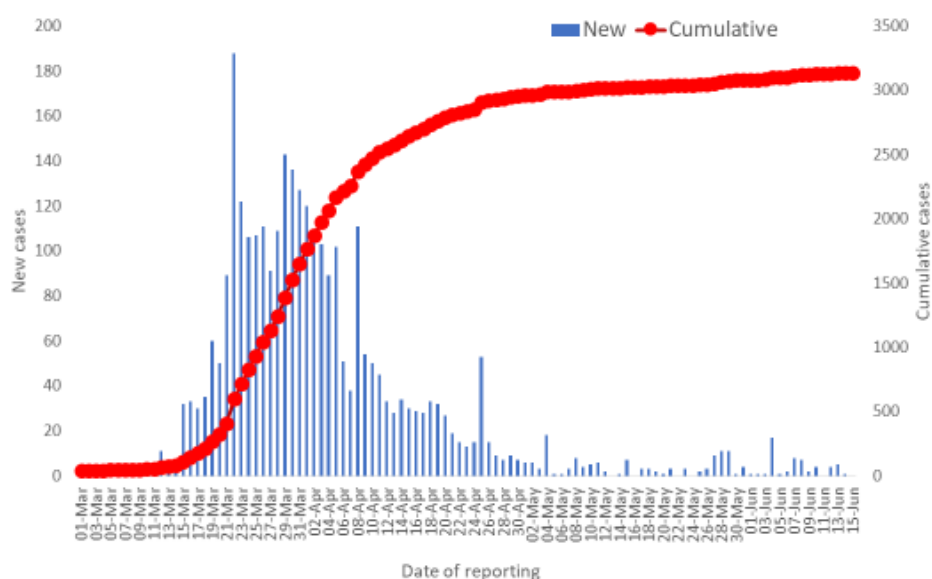

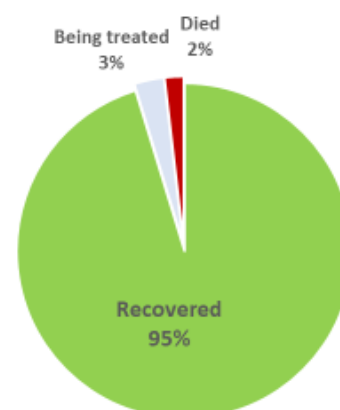
### SPOTLIGHT

- On the 15<sup>th</sup> of June 2020, no new cases of laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 were reported by the Ministry of Public Health. The total number of cases reported in Thailand is currently 3,135.
- Of these cases, about 95% (2,987) have recovered, 2% (58) have died and 3% (90) are receiving treatment.
- No new deaths were reported today.
- In the past three weeks, all COVID-19 cases detected in Thailand have been in repatriated Thai nationals (there have been no reported cases due to local transmission).

### UPDATE FROM THE MINISTRY OF PUBLIC HEALTH

- A survey undertaken by the Ministry of Public Health among 2,203 respondents found 81% can access information relating to COVID-19 prevention, but only about 55% say that they are willing to adapt their behavior accordingly.
- The Department of Health emphasised the importance, especially learning from the reemergence of COVID-19 in a fresh market in Beijing for operators, vendors and buyers to keep such markets clean at all times, especially any frequently-touched surface. Buyers are highly recommended not to touch fresh meats with bare hands.
- Members of the public should always ensure that any food consumed is well-cooked. Using separate utensils and frequent hand washing will help minimise the risk of contracting COVID-19 and other infectious diseases.

# UPDATE FROM THE CCSA: PHASE 4 REOPENING

- The CCSA has approved the fourth phase of relaxed measures, effective 15th June. The Emergency Decree will remain in force until further notice. The night curfew is lifted (effective Sunday, 14th June).
- Some establishments and services considered 'at-risk' can resume their services (see infographic): alcohol can be served in restaurants. Sport stadiums can organize games and broadcast on TV but without spectators present.
- Some high-risk establishments are not allowed to reopen, including
  - pubs, bars, karaoke bars, massage parlors
  - bouncy castles and ball play areas for children
  - bull fighting, cock fighting, fish fighting and similar activities
- Effective 15th June, international schools/universities, tutorial schools, and schools with pupils less than 120 that follow proscribed measures may resume educational activities. The start of term for other schools is 1st July 2020.
- To accommodate journeys across provinces, all public transport (buses, vans, trains, ferries, airplanes) must provide breaks during the journey, spacing between seats and must limit the number of passengers

### ESTABLISHMENTS AND SERVICES THAT WILL REOPEN IN THE FOURTH PHASE

Starting from 15 June 2020

-  International schools, institutes, and tutorial schools that students must not be over 120 persons (for instruction, exams, and training)
-  Nurseries and elderly care centers (for daily service)
-  Convention halls, exhibitions, theaters, concert halls, event showcases, musical performances
-  Scientific centers for education, science parks
-  Public transportation, trains, airplanes (sitting in two seats and skipping one seat)
-  Film/TV production (staff must not be over 150 persons, and spectators not over 50 persons)

### ESTABLISHMENTS AND SERVICES THAT WILL REOPEN IN THE FOURTH PHASE

Starting from 15 June 2020

-  Activities at parks or activities grounds, such as aerobic dance (not over 50 persons)
-  Amusement parks, water parks, playgrounds, and game arcades in community malls -- except for ball houses and bouncy castles
-  Sports stadiums, sports fields, and gymnasiums (competitions without spectators may be held)
-  Spas, onsen bathing, Thai massage, and steaming services (for groups, services should limit the customers)
-  Restaurants may now serve alcoholic beverages to customers
-  Pubs, bars, karaoke bars, massage parlors, and similar services are not yet allowed
