Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) WHO Thailand Situation Report – 26 March 2020




Data as reported by the Thai Ministry of Public Health on 26 March 2020

HIGHLIGHTS

- On the 26th of March 2020, 111 new cases of laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 were announced by the Ministry of Public Health of Thailand (MoPH), bringing the total number of cases to 1,045.
- Nine cases are linked to previous clusters involving pubs and Boxing stadiums. Nineteen cases are close contacts of other cases and one is related to religious events in Malaysia.
- Fifteen cases are related to foreigners and Thais returning from abroad or those working with international travelers. Three healthcare providers (9 to date) have become infected, one additional case was detected through surveillance for pneumonitis of
- Of the 1,045 COVID-19 reported cases, 88 have recovered and 953 are receiving treatment. About 20% of cases did not have symptoms at the time they were tested. To date, cases in Thailand have tended to be younger and disproportionately male. This probably reflects surveillance and testing strategies. As the outbreak continues, we anticipate the age distribution to shift towards older age groups and a more equal gender balance.

- THAILAND SITUATION IN NUMBERS total and new cases in last 24 hours
- 1,045 confirmed (111 new) 4 deaths, 4 severe cases 953 persons receiving treatment.



- There is now a cumulative total of 14,122 Patients Under Investigation (PUIs) since the COVID-19 outbreak began, including 7,649 people being actively investigated or treated. This group includes people being treated for other conditions who are no longer suspected of having COVID-19 infection.
- Prime Minister Prayuth Chan Ocha has issued a National Emergency Decree effective until April 30th. This
 decree authorizes government agencies to effect or enforce specific actions necessary to reduce
 transmission of the pandemic virus and bring the epidemic under control. The public is requested to
 remain inside their homes and to strictly limit all social contacts.



RECOMMENDATIONS AND ADVICE FOR THE PUBLIC

- Remain inside your home. Leave your home only for essential activities (e.g. medical care, purchase food).
- Maintain a distance of at least 1.5 meters from all other persons at all times.
- Frequently wash your hands, especially after contact with ill people or their environment. An alcohol-based hand rub is also effective
- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth.
- If unwell, wear a cloth or paper mask. Do not use N95 respirators as supplies are limited and they are critically needed for healthcare workers.
- Cover coughs & sneezes with disposable tissues or clothing and frequently wash your hands.
- Do not shake hands, embrace, share eating utensils or smoking devices with other people.
- Keep all commonly touched surfaces clean. Advice on cleaning practices and the survivability of the SARS-CoV-2 virus on surfaces & in different settings is available here.

- Communicate risk and event information to all communities and counter misinformation
- Minimize social and economic impact through multisectoral partnerships

PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

What Thailand is doing

- On March 27th at 2 pm Bangkok time, WHO Thailand will offer a webcast titled "Urgent Insights from Wuhan". Two senior Chinese physicians with first-hand experience responding to the Wuhan outbreak will discuss clinical and hospital management. - Thailand has strong capacities for case detection, risk assessment, case investigation, laboratory diagnosis, clinical management, infection prevention and control, and risk communication.
- With WHO support, the National Institute of Health is supporting specimen testing for other countries as requested.
- Visitors to Thailand traveling from affected areas are being screened on arrival. Possible illnesses may be reported to the Department of Disease Control using the 1422 hotline.
- The Ministry has introduced a self-reporting online tool, available in Thai, English and Chinese, which can be accessed here.

- WHO Thailand remains in frequent direct contact with the Royal Thai Government through the Ministry of Public Health, sharing information on key developments, guidelines and scientific updates
