Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) WHO Thailand Situation Report – 2 April 2020



Data as reported by the Thai Ministry of Public Health on 2 April 2020


HIGHLIGHTS

- On the 2nd of April 2020, 104 new cases of laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 were announced by the Ministry of Public Health of Thailand, bringing the total number of cases to 1,875.
- Of the newly reported cases, 24 cases were identified in people entering the country, highlighting the need for strict compliance with quarantine requirements. The Thai Government has announced that between now and 15 April, Thailand will take steps to decrease the number of people entering the country.

THAILAND SITUATION total and new cases reported in the last 24 hours

1,875 confirmed (104 new) 16 deaths (3 new) 1,355 people hospitalized 23 severe cases 505 recovered

- A total of 38 of the new cases are close contacts of previously confirmed cases, highlighting the need for strict adherence with social distancing in all settings. Cases are also still being reported in individuals whose work brings them into contact with large numbers of people, suggesting that further social distancing restrictions may be required.
- 62 of 76 provinces have now reported laboratory-confirmed cases of COVID-19. Approximately half of the cases to date have occurred in Bangkok and half have been detected in other provinces.

UPDATES FROM THE MINISTRY OF PUBLIC HEALTH IN THAILAND

- The Government has announced a nationwide curfew beginning Friday April 3rd. All residents are instructed to remain inside their homes between the hours of 10pm and 4am.
- The Thai Government requests that everyone wear a cloth mask when outside their home. To date, 43 million pieces of cloth masks have already been distributed.
- The Ministry of Public Health is establishing extra capacity for COVID-19 patients and a plan for further expanding this 'surge capacity' is under development. Bangkok and the municipality currently have more than 1,000 beds available as well as a reserve of 1,000 beds in other locations (hotels, etc.). It also has a reserve of 300 ventilators identified through a network of hospitals. At the Provincial level, there is a reserve of 10,000 beds and 1,000 ventilators.
- Measures are being taken to ensure the availability of drugs, medical supplies and equipment.
- The Ministry of Public Health has allocated 1.5 million surgical masks for health facilities, including those not under the Ministry. Distribution will be enough to maintain 1 month of stocks.

The current stock of N95 masks for healthcare workers held by the Ministry of Public Health is not enough
to meet the estimated national demand of 60,000 masks per day. Procurement is a challenge due to very
high global demand. Urgent research is being undertaken on the effectiveness of UVC irradiation for N95
disinfection and reuse.

ADVICE FOR THE PUBLIC

- Remain inside your home. Leave your home only for essential activities (e.g. medical care, purchase food).
- Always try to maintain a distance of at least 1.5 meters from all other persons.
- Wash your hands frequently. An alcohol-based hand rub is also effective.
- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Wear a mask when outside your home. Do not use N95 respirators as supplies are limited and they are critically needed for healthcare workers.
- Cough or sneeze into your elbow or a clean tissue.
- Dispose of tissues immediately and wash your hands.
- Do not shake hands, embrace, share eating utensils or smoking devices with other people.
- Keep all commonly touched surfaces clean. Advice on cleaning practices and the survivability of the SARS-CoV-2 virus on surfaces & in different settings is available here.
