
The 2021 ECOSOC resolution on the work of the Task Force

Calls upon the Task Force to support Member States:

- In their national COVID-19 response and recovery efforts
- Implement the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control
- strengthen regulatory and legal frameworks to reduce the burden of NCDs and mental health conditions
- In strengthening health systems to address NCDs and mental health, including those in vulnerable situations

Encourages bilateral and multilateral donors and relevant stakeholders to support Member States:

• Through the new UN Multi-Partner Trust Fund to support countries to catalyze action on NCDs and mental health.





The Multi-Partner Trust Fund to Catalyze Country Action for NCDs and Mental Health...

Called for by ECOSOC, WHA and the WHO Independent High-level Commission on NCDs – and established by WHO, UNDP and UNICEF.

The Fund will catalyze action in LMICs in response to country demand and needs.

A USD 250 million catalytic fund modelled by 2030 to contribute to:

- Saving 8 million lives;
- Averting USD 350 billion in economic losses.

In the first instance the Fund will support countries to address NCDs and mental health as part of COVID-19 response and recovery

The Task Force is calling on all Member States and development partners to contribute to fully resourcing this crucial new initiative

Responding to the Challenge of Non-communicable Diseases

Nuclear techniques assist in the prevention, early detection, diagnosis and treatment of NCDs1

uclear techniques play an integral role in the nanagement of non-communicable diseases NCDs) such as cancer, cardiovascular liseases, and neurological conditions, and can be used to design and evaluate nterventions to address malnutrition in all

Cancer, Cancer causes 9 million deaths each ear.2 Medical imaging, including X-rays, and nuclear medicine techniques are critical in cancer care, in terms of: early and accurate liagnosis, including assessment of the ocation and spread of the disease (staging); ollow-up of the patient to detect relapses; ognostic evaluation; and appropriate herapeutic decisions and follow-up of the sponse to treatment.3 Radiotherapy is a ey element of cancer treatment for every second cancer patient worldwide. Modern adiotherapy allows automated delivery of a precise dose to the tumour and avoids the urrounding critical structures, giving the atient a chance to recover with minimal side-

United Nations high-level meetings have highlighted the need for UN agencies, including IAEA, to scale up their work on NCDs as part of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

NCDs contribute to ill health, poverty and inequities and slow the development of countries. Every year 15 million people die before age 70 from NCDs, with 86% of these premature deaths occurring in low- and middle-income countries.

Major progress on NCDs is possible. Premature deaths from NCDs are largely caused by modifiable behavioural risk factors, such as unhealthy diet, tobacco use, physical inactivity and harmful use of alcohol. Environmental risks (e.g. air pollution) and constrained access to basic services also contribute significantly to

Addressing NCDs requires coordinated action from all UN agencies within a broader whole-of-



UNITED NATIONS RELIEF AND WORKS AGENCY FOR PALESTINE REFUGEES IN THE NEAR EAST

Strategic approaches common to NCDs and COVID-19

Develops and implements comprehensive response plans that include NCDs, comprising coordination, planning, monitoring, travel arrangements, rules, surveillance, case management and referral, service delivery, instructions for use of personal protective equipment, infection prevention and control, communication and community involvement.

Procures medicines for NCDs and other conditions during the pandemic.

Develops and implements standard operating procedures for NCD service delivery during the pandemic, including delivery of medicines to patients, and improving quality of care.

Ensures that people with NCDs, for example those with diabetes and hypertension are provided with quality care as part of improving family health.

Examples of current/recent activities

In close coordination with hosting authorities NCD patients have been prioritized for COVID-19 vaccination. There has been training of staff and venues have been made available for

An existing e-health system has been enhanced to help monitor management and outcomes of care during the pandemic, including NCDs and mental health and psychosocial

Social media (including open access sessions) have been used to support those with NCDs during the pandemic, including clarifying issues around COVID-19 vaccination.



COVID-19 Strategic Preparedness and Response Plan for UNRWA UNRWA's health programme 2021






The Access Initiative to Quit Tobacco (AIQT) continues to support countries scale up access to comprehensive tobacco cessation services

Task Force flagship programme to catalyze multisectoral country action on NCDs and mental health: investment cases










26 NCD investment cases conducted

Examples of policy changes following investment cases

Armenia

Anti-smoking bill approved in 2019. Enacted into law in 2020.

Barbados

National Workplace Wellness Policy 2019 was adopted to promote healthy lifestyles. The Policy's rationale cites the findings of the 2015 NCD Investment Case mission.

Kyrgyzstan

Set a minimum price for vodka and banned alcohol advertisement on the internet

Mongolia

Campaign to reduce salt consumption

Philippines


Law adopted to increase excise tax on alcohol, e-cigarettes, vapour products, and foods with high salt content

Saudi Arabia

Following the 2018 NCD IC, launch of a strategic plan for healthy food by the Saudi FDA



Scaling up long term country action...



Supported under the WHO UNDP joint programme through the EU-WHO Health System Strengthening for UHC Partnership

Focus is on:

- Coherent, whole-of-government approaches
- Legal and investment frameworks
- Leadership of parliamentarians and other elected officials
- Strengthening partnerships in country

- Proof of concept for the MPTF



How Governments can encourage United Nations Country Teams to scale up support for NCDs and how Governments and United Nations Country Teams can work together to agree joint action.


