



# France (AFD)

## **AID PRIORITIES**

Agence Française de Développement (AFD) is the operator of France's bilateral development finance mechanism. Its actions are in line with the policy set out in France's Framework Document for Development Cooperation. AFD is also responsible for the management of the French Global Environment Facility (French GEF), which co-finances projects that address the environment

AFD has been entrusted with a mandate by the French national authorities to contribute to economic and social development in its geographic areas of operation. It achieves this by financing and supporting development projects and programmes, and participating in debate, research and dialogue with relevant stakeholders. The aim of these actions is to contribute to more sustainable and shared economic growth, improve living conditions in the poorest regions and countries, contribute to preserving the planet, and help stabilize fragile or post-conflict countries.

# WASH PROGRAMME TARGETS/ **OUTCOMES**

While waiting for the update of its sector strategy (ongoing), AFD still uses the average annual target results for 2014–2018. Every year, financing allocated by AFD between 2014 and 2018 aimed to on average: 1) provide 1.5 million people with sustainable access to drinking-water; 2) provide 1 million people with sustainable access to sanitation; 3) improve the quality of drinking-water supply systems for 4 million people; and 4) improve the quality of sanitation systems for 1.5 million people. Each year, AFD publishes a monitoring report of the WASH strategy implementation, including results.

As an example, AFD provided a non-sovereign loan of 30 million euros to the Phnom Penh Water Supply Authority (PPWSA) in Cambodia to finance the construction of the 2nd phase of the drinking-water production plant in Niroth (130,000 m<sup>3</sup>/d) and the extension of the distribution network. This project was launched in 2012 and has been carried out within the timeframe and allocated budget. Its success demonstrates PPWSA's performance, which is held up as a model in the subregion — it supports the increase in demand in a rapidly growing city while providing a high-quality service and maintaining a social policy for the poorest populations.

# WASH STRATEGY/ACTIVITIES

AFD selected four areas of operation for 2014–2018 in line with the previous Sectorial Intervention

- Strengthening the definition of clear, effective and inclusive sectoral frameworks (19% of financing and 58% of projects in 2017);
- Preserving resources in the context of climate change (14% of financing in 2017);
- Providing access to efficient and sustainable services for all (59% of financing in 2017); and
- Managing flood risks in the context of climate change (8% of financing in 2017).



# WASH AID PRIORITIES: DISTRIBUTION OF AID DISBURSEMENTS




# **WASH AID COMMITMENTS AND** DISBURSEMENTS

# **LEVERAGING OF AID**

In 2017, AFD granted a 10 million euro loan to the 'Banque Marocaine du Commerce Extérieur' to finance a credit line dedicated to the water and sanitation sector in Morocco.

This project aims to facilitate the emergence of public and private projects, which will contribute to the protection of water resources in Morocco, including projects on industrial pollution reduction and water reuse, while at the same time give better access to banking services to the water and sanitation sector in Morocco. AFD also finances capacity building for the bank (300 000 euro grant). This project is co-financed with the European Investment Bank.

### LESSONS/IMPACTS

In 2017, thanks to AFD projects:

- 3.2 million people have benefited from a safely managed drinking-water service;
- 440 000 people have benefited from a basic drinking-water service;
- 82 000 people have benefited from a safely managed sanitation service; and
- 95 000 people have benefited from a basic sanitation service.

In 2017, 44% of AFD's commitments in the WASH sector were co-financed by a financial partner other than the beneficiary.


