Why do we need a new TB action plan?

REPRESENTS 1 000 PEOPLE, DATA FROM 2020

Major public health burden



69 000 estimated new cases of DR -TB



29 000

estimated people with TB/HIV coinfection



The European Region is home to 24% of the global burden of MDR-TB and 47% of the global burden of pre-XDR-TB

Main challenges



Low DR-TB treatment success rate



TB/HIV coinfection rates are high and rising: 12% among new TB cases (2020)



Extremely slow uptake of TB preventive treatment: only 16% of target population enrolled

New challenges and opportunities



COVID-19-related **disruptions** to TB services have led to decreases in TB case notifications



Impact of **humanitarian crises** on the continued provision of essential TB services and potential loss of progress



New options for TB prevention, screening, diagnosis, treatment and delivery of TB services

Renewed political and financial commitment needed to reinvent the TB response and get back on track to reach regional and global targets



What is the regional TB action plan for the WHO European Region?

The TB action plan outlines strategies to end the TB epidemic tailored to the regional context and is fully aligned with WHO strategies to end the global TB epidemic. The action plan includes specific TB indicators, milestones and targets to be achieved by 2025 and 2030, and contributes to the European Programme of Work 2020-2025.

Strategic and operational shifts to end TB in the Region

- Finish the unfinished agenda for ending TB and DR-TB
- Put people at the centre and leave no one behind
- Reduce TB incidence, find early, treat fully
- Intensify research and innovation
- Regain losses caused by COVID-19 and mainstream the innovations in the TB response
- Adjust the approach in the light of the war in Ukraine and its impact in the Region
- Build resilience of TB services to future crises



The TB action plan targets will be met by:



Engaging primary health care and communities to achieve universal health coverage and strengthen health systems



Providing new options for TB prevention, screening, diagnosis, treatment and delivery of services



Scaling up digital health solutions for screening, diagnosis and treatment adherence to make access to TB services faster, better and more impactful



Having a strong focus on DR-TB with:





- people-centered models of service delivery
- · robust patient support systems to reduce hospitalizations



 universal access to rapid molecular diagnosis for TB and its comorbidities



Meaningfully engaging civil society and affected communities



Putting TB back on the agenda in low-incidence TB countries, to reach TB elimination
